## Letter from the President:

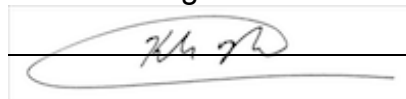
The 2012 fall semester is likely wrapping up for most districts in California. For me it's been a whirlwind of activity from faculty evaluations to transitioning to WorldShare Management Services to the ongoing budget planning and decisions. For the first time in several years, there is some positive feelings about budgetary matters due to the passage of Proposition 30. Certainly it isn't a panacea, but it feels good nonetheless. My hope it will manifest into something positive for our libraries.

The Council of Chief Librarians has been sponsoring a general email discussion list for over 15-years, and we recently migrated to Google hosting. The membership on the list (192 subscribers) has been pretty loose over the years, though it has primarily been California deans and directors. Based on the practice of recent years, the Executive Board recently decided to allow the email list to continue being open for anyone who wishes to subscribe. The list has been renamed **California Community College Libraries** and described as "A discussion forum for librarians, library managers, and library deans within the California Community College system." The planning for the annual Deans and Directors meeting in Sacramento is well underway. We're pretty excited about the program and you can expect to hear from such luminaries as Chancellor Brice Harris, library design wizard Aaron Schmidt, and the Free Range Librarian K.G. Schneider. The Executive Board will also present our strategic plan for the next few years. The dates are March 21-22, 2013 and includes free registration and hotel room for one person per campus. Registration will be posted soon on our web site.

I think many of you know I'm a technologist and that I enjoy playing with the latest gadgets, apps, and social media options. According to a recent article in the Harvard Business Review (<http://bit.ly/hbrforcl>), "Our browsing habits, our conversations with friends, our movements and location — all of these things are being monetized." This fall I've been giving <http://app.net> a try because it pushes me into a non-librarian community (mostly developers), allows me to see what developers are interested in creating, and demonstrates a more sustainable business model that aligns well with library values. As a child I never had baby dolls, but I did have a Barbie doll. I had Barbie (stiff as a board) and her man, Ken, with the painted plastic hair. Barbie, Ken, and their friends Midge and Alan had the convertible, the bedroom furniture, the kitchen set and the patio for relaxing by a pool my Mom made out of aluminum foil and a plastic gift box. My friend Judy, who fancied herself a budding interior designer, fashioned a two story mansion for Barbie and company, using a card table, covered jewelry boxes for stairs, and Lincoln Logs to create the long sweeping driveway. But the best part of the Barbie house was a real lamp that featured a tiny bulb running on a battery.

That was my reading light after midnight. Mom could never figure out why I had such a hard time getting up each morning for school. Little did she know that every night after I was sent to bed at a reasonable hour, I lay waiting for the sound of my parents gentle snoring in the next room. Then I crept out of bed and read the Dana Girls, Treasure Island, Nancy Drew, Trixie Belden, and Hans Brinker until my eyelids could stay open no longer. Dad could never understand why that light burnt out so quickly!

I tell this story to illustrate just how much I love reading and always have. My fondest memories were going to the library with my parents. I loved the smell of the books, the heft of them in my hands, and the quiet respect for writing that permeated every nook and cranny of our small public library. My experiences with books opened my eyes to travel and ideas far beyond my small town perspective in Morton, Illinois. They inspired me to excel in school and dream of going to college. At three universities my love affair with books continued and thrived. I have moved nineteen times in my adult life, and each time I've moved my first stop on my first day in a new location was the local public library where I signed up for a card.

I can't imagine a life without books, but today's libraries are so much more. The heart of academic freedom is found in our college libraries where our warrior librarians fight for the intellectual souls of our students. A library is a place of wonder for those students who don't have a story like mine. It's where they learn to read critically, search for knowledge, and find the questions that may guide their tomorrows.

The State budget cuts in recent years have devastated our library collections and databases. Many colleges have not hired librarians or support staff, and they have cut service hours and services. The State Librarian Association has done wonders with very modest resources by pooling resources and moving to open source options. The passage of Proposition 30 has NOT meant a return to more affluent times, but it does mean it is time for us to renew our commitment to our mission. And our mission cannot be achieved without remembering our heart: Libraries!

We are eleven months into our first year of a statewide contract with EBSCO. Even though there have been some hiccups with access, from January to November 2012 there were 138,032,800 searches by our students on the EBSCO databases. It's great to see how this project has been successful for our libraries.

### **ALA FREE WEBINAR ON DIGITAL LITERACY AND LIBRARIES** **Dec. 11, 4:00-5:00pm (PST)**

How do librarians and educators keep up with the continual stream of new technology and digital advancements? To facilitate a national dialogue on digital literacy education, the ALA's Office for Information Technology Policy (OITP) and Digital Literacy Task Force will host the free webinar "**Assessing Digital Literacy: Outcomes and Impact**" on December 11, 2012, 7:00-8:00p.m. EST. Attendees will hear from participants who are exploring ways to measure the effectiveness of digital literacy programs.

Topics will include:

- How do we motivate and support library staff in staying current?
- What are the perceived obstacles that interfere with the continuing education process?
- What resources or continuous learning models already are available to the profession, and what are their pros/cons?

The panel—moderated by ALA OITP Fellow Renee Hobbs—includes Karen Hanson, federal program officer, National Telecommunications and Information Administration at the U.S. Department of Commerce, and Julie Coiro, assistant professor, University of Rhode Island School of Education.

## WHAT'S IN A WORD: LITERACY vs. COMPETENCY

A classic way of resolving planning disputes about where to lay a path is to not plan a path until sufficient time has elapsed for pedestrians to demark the way they want to walk and then pave the paths where people walked.

Can we do the same with language issues when two different terms compete for primacy in description of a key concept in librarianship? The two terms in question are competence and literacy.

Information competence (competency)

Or,

Information literacy

Iteration of these terms in Google (on 10/22/12)

Term	Number of Google hits	Number from .edu domain
"Information Competency"	47,800	21,700
"Information Competence"	33,400	7,580
"Information Literacy"	3,230,000	389,000

Note that the title of the ACRL 2010 Standards is:

***Information Literacy Competency Standards for Higher Education***



But the phrase “information competency” does not appear separately anywhere in the document while there are 54 iterations of the phrase “information literacy”.

It should also be noted that when Google decided to release educational tools for successful use of Google, they called it “search literacy”.

When the CCL Executive Board was engaged in the selection of descriptive language for its “Strategic Plan” Goals and Strategies, **Information Literacy** was selected for the draft language.

### **THE ACCJC VISITING TEAM: Details, Details, Details**

**In response to many queries regarding aspects of Accrediting team composition, the Academic Senate of the California Community Colleges has published the above referenced paper. The paragraphs which detail how to become an evaluator are included here.**

In response to some of the concerns of the Academic Senate, we are pleased to note that the ACCJC has implemented a new Bio-Data Form for Evaluators this year. The form has been modified to include a signature line for CEO recommendation in lieu of a letter of recommendation for individuals to be entered into the database of potential evaluators. All individuals are required to have a CEO signature in order to be entered into the ACCJC’s evaluator database. Additionally, the ACCJC encourages recommendations for faculty participation from the Academic Senate, keeping in mind that faculty experience and expertise is the key focus for team member selection.

Following submission of the Bio-Data Form, faculty should receive an email that the information has been received and that they have been placed in the database of potential evaluators. The ACCJC also requires that once an evaluator's name has been placed into the database, he or she must complete the ACCJC "Accreditation Basics" online course found on the Commission's website. Mr. Jack Pond, Vice President of Team Operations, is charged with assembling teams, and he welcomes follow-up email correspondence ([jpond@accjc.org](mailto:jpond@accjc.org)) from those who wish to serve.

### **LIBRARY COPYRIGHT ALLIANCE FILES BRIEF SUPPORTING GOOGLE, ARGUES REVERSAL ON CLASS CERTIFICATION**

On November 16, the Library Copyright Alliance (LCA) (ALA, ACRL and ARL) filed an amicus brief in support of the defendant and arguing that a recent decision on class certification should be reversed. The appeal is the latest development in long-running litigation over Google's project to scan and index millions of books from research library collections. The LCA amicus brief concludes:

“Google Book Search is a valuable resource for researchers, scholars, libraries, and authors, and it makes vast amounts of information and learning far more accessible to the public than ever before possible”

## **NEWS FROM THE COLLEGES:**

### **SADDLEBACK COLLEGE**

The library building was renovated and we finally moved back in August, 2012, after 2.5 years of being in a temporary location. In October, 2012, the LRC building renovation received the American Institute of Architects (AIA) Honor Award. Students are enjoying the renovated LRC building that for all intents and purposes is new.

While the renovation was underway, we added OCLC’s QuestionPoint as a service. Last summer, we discontinued QP because our students barely used it even though we promoted it widely. Last spring, we added the LibraryH3lp web chat service. We’re very pleasantly surprised with its use: as of November 29<sup>th</sup>, 325 Saddleback College students have used the chat reference service during the first 14 weeks of the semester!

Our colleague Wendy Gordon created the Library’s facebook page. She recently posted her own picture of kittens and books and within 15 minutes, 25 people had seen the photo and within 24 hours, 106 persons had either seen it or shared it!

### **MT. SAN JACINTO COLLEGE:**

Mt. San Jacinto College Libraries are migrating from Sirsi to OCLC Worldshare Management Services (WMS). They anticipate going live with the new system in January 2013.

### **YUBA COLLEGE:**

Yuba College library was commended by the ACCJC Accreditation team for the work of their library staff!

They are both happy and surprised by this news because for years they have had to deal with budgetary challenges and staffing shortages.

### **ALLAN HANCOCK COLLEGE:**

The news from Allan Hancock College is that we successfully launched our new ILS this month. Polaris was selected for a number of reasons, including integration with our existing Banner student system. It is also familiar to our students, because it is used by the Black Gold public libraries on the central coast. So far, response from users has been very positive.

We also received the happy news from our Web Services Committee that the library page is the most visited one on our public website after our home page. Analytics are a wonderful thing!

Finally, the Friends of the AHC Library hosted a very successful Friday faculty lecture series in October and November entitled "Calamities, Disasters and Catastrophes". While the series was inspired by the anniversary of the Titanic disaster, we also covered lesser known (but equally enthralling) events such as the Great Molasses Flood, Dustbowl Bunny Plague, and Tapioca Timebomb. ### **EL CAMINO COLLEGE:**

Vincent Robles retired in June 2012 after 21 years as the Periodicals and subsequently the lead Reference librarian. Vince promoted outreach services to the campus through the Library's sponsorship of many campus forums always accompanied by a bibliography and/or display of library materials.

Seth Daugherty joined the faculty in September 2012 as reference librarian. Seth is a graduate of the SLIS program at SJS and also has a degree in Instructional Technology from CSU Chico. He has worked part-time in a number of Southern California community college libraries. He will fulfill Reference responsibilities, provide Bibliographic Instruction support and also use his technology skills to begin creating a series of short videos featuring library resources.

### **HARTNELL COLLEGE**

There have been several significant personnel and other changes at Hartnell College Library during the last year. For the 2012-13 academic year, the library has once again been placed under the direction of the Vice President of Information and Technology Resources, Matt Coombs. Matt is our interim supervisor, until a more permanent college

administrative structure is determined. Last year the library was part of the Math, Science, Engineering, Library, & PE division, and we were under the direction of a dean.

Another big change this last year was the retirement of Jennifer Lagier Fellguth, Hartnell's Systems/Technology Librarian. Jennifer retired at the end of the spring 2012 semester. Deborah Stephens was hired as our new Systems/Technology Librarian, and she started at Hartnell with the beginning of the fall semester. The Student Services Librarian position which was formerly held by retired librarian Bill Rawson remains vacant for now.

### **COLLEGE OF SAN MATEO:**



Stephanie Alexander has joined the College of San Mateo Library as Digital Services and Instruction Librarian. Prior to her assignment at CSM, Stephanie was Reference and Instruction Librarian University of Southern California's Leavey Library

where she worked with the Writing and Orientation Programs to educate incoming students about the resources available to them through the USC Libraries. Previously, Stephanie was at the University of Colorado Boulder, working as the Associate Faculty Director for Reference in Norlin Library and liaising with the departments of Sociology, Communication, Journalism, and Mass Communication. Stephanie has served on a variety of national committees within the American Library Association including work within the divisions of ACRL and RUSA.

### **Pasadena City College**

Shatford Library offered extended operating hours for students to study for Fall 2012 final exams. During the first week of extended hours, the library held various activities to help students de-stress. Each night featured a different main activity for two hours and then held an open lounge where students could help themselves to various puzzles and games as well as materials for making their own stress balls, origami, and bookmarks or play with Play Doh or color. Staff brought in various puzzles and games as well as picture props, and library-owned iPads were loaded with lots of games. Local game store Game Empire

Pasadena donated "Settlers of Catan," "Carcassonne," and "Set," and had a staff member go to the library to teach people how to play them.
